#### **EREMOPHILA CUNEIFOLIA**

I saw a specimen of this beautiful plant in flower at Roger Wileman's place some years ago. Roger kindly provided me with a plant which he had grafted onto *Myoporum* rootstock. This summer, when not much else was happening, it flowered for the first time. And what a splash of colour it provided.

Eremophila cuneifolia is a spreading shrub growing to a height of between 0.4 and 1.8 metres, with branches and leaves that are thickly covered with sticky, shiny resin. The leaves are arranged alternately and clustered near the ends of the stems.

The species was first formally described by Friedrich Wilhelm Ludwig Kraenzlin in 1929. The type specimen was collected by the explorer Charles Crossland, near Mount Hale on the upper reaches of the Murchison River, about 140 kilometres north west of Meekatharra in central Western Australia.



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
